Requirements


Sophomore status: This class is required for graduation.

Students will be able to discuss and research people and events in history.

They will be able to research various topics and people of world history. Some example would include: Socrates, Plato, Rousseau, Bolivar, Jefferson,, Robespierre, Napoleon, Watt, Pasteur, Dickens. SunYat-Sen. Ho Chi Minh, Mao Zedong, Einstein, Lenin, Trotsky, Hitler, Mussolini, Tojo, Mac-Arthur, Churchill, Roosevelt, Kennedy, Khrushchev, "Che" Guevara, Reagan, Bin Ladin, & Bush. The topics are endless. This class will reflect the personality of the students enrolled in the course. The course will adjust to the needs and the

questions of the students.

Due to the topics of the class there are some documentaries and films that deal with serious social issues. Students must inform parents / guardians that this will be part of the class throughout.



The text for the class is Modern World History with the addition of other supplemental readings. Attendance is vital. An old African proverb is appropriate for this requirement: **"Those who are absent are always wrong."** Throughout the course it is important that views and ideas be openly discussed and analyzed to determine their merit, relevance and effectiveness in our society. Students will be required to keep a notebook that can hold all needed material for the class. Students should be prepared and ready to participate.

Basic Rules: Classroom Management

YOUR TEACHERS ARE SERIOUS ABOUT CLASSROOM MANAGE-MENT.

- A. **Tardies**: We will strictly follow the school policy concerning tardies. Students need to be <u>in their seats</u> <u>prior to the bell</u>. Students with three or more tardies will lose any and all accrued bonus points.
- B. Attendance: Attendance is crucial for class success. <u>Perfect attendance</u> <u>will be rewarded</u>. Students that are absent will be able to make up work based on individual circumstances. Students who are assigned opportunity class need to get work from teacher prior to O.C.. It is the <u>stu-</u> dent's responsibility to ask for work.
- C. **Behavior**: Each student shall be held

accountable for their behavior in class. <u>Be</u> <u>attentive and ready to respond</u>. You are not to walk around the classroom when class is in session without the permission of the teacher. Please show respect for everyone and they will do the same for you.

- **D.** Restroom breaks: <u>No restroom breaks</u>. The seven-minute passing period is for students to go to their lockers and to use the restroom.
- E. Cell Phones: <u>No cell phones</u>. Cells should not be seen or heard in class. See school policy. Phones will be taken away.
- **F. Illness**: Those students who feel ill will be sent to the <u>health office</u> so that they may receive proper attention.
- **G.** Work: All work must be <u>turned in on time</u>. If absent all work is due the day student returns. Students are responsible for getting missed assignments due to an absence.
- H. Late Work: <u>No late work</u>. Assignments not turned in by the student will not be ac-

cepted late. Everyone needs to be responsible.

- Bonus: Anything done outside of class that relate to the history topic may be given bonus points. Anything! But is must relate to the topic being studied. Students should not rely on bonus to "bailout" their grade but to enhance it. Students will keep track of all bonus points in their bonus sheet.
- J. Cheating: (a.k.a. copying, plagiarizing, giving answers) All parties involved will be given a zero and reported to the proper authorities. <u>Cheating robs all students and</u> <u>teachers of their honor</u>. All bonus points will be lost. Possible expul-

Teaching Standards

10.1 Rise of Democracy: Students relate the moral and ethical principles in ancient Greek and Roman philosophy, in Judaism, and in Christianity to the development of Western political thought.

10.2 Revolutions/Fight for Freedom: Students compare and contrast the Glorious Revolution of England, the American Revolution, and the French Revolution and their enduring effects worldwide on the political expectations for self-government and individual liberty.
10.3 Industrial Revolution/World of Work: Students analyze the effects of the Industrial Revolution in England, France, Germany, Japan, and the United States.

10.4 Imperialism/Empire Building/Control: Students analyze patterns of global change in the era of New Imperialism in at least two of the following regions or countries: Africa, Southeast Asia, China, India, Latin America, and the Philippines.

10.5 World at War-Causes: Students analyze the causes and course of the First World War.

10.6 World War I-Effects/Great Depression: Students analyze the effects of the First World War.

10.7 Rise of Dictators!: Students analyze the rise of totalitarian governments after World War I.

10.8 World War II: Students analyze the causes and consequences of World War II.

10.9 Cold War: US vs USSR: Students analyze the international developments in the post-World War II world.

10.10 Nation Building: Students analyze instances of nation-building in the contemporary world in at least two of the following regions or countries: the Middle East, Africa, Mexico and other parts of Latin America, and China.

10.11 Modern World/Technology/Global Connections: Students analyze the integration of countries into the world economy and the information, technological, and communications revolutions (e.g., television, satellites, computers).

You can also use this space to remind readers to mark their calendars for a regular event, such as a breakfast meeting for vendors every third Tuesday of the month, or a biannual charity auction.

If space is available, this is a good place to insert a clip art image or some other graphic.
